# **Think Before You Post**

Cyber Safety Lesson Plan (Age 11)

This lesson teaches students the importance of thoughtful online sharing, emphasising the impact of digital posts on personal and others' digital footprints.

# **Learning Objectives**

Students will be able to:

- Implement a plan for maintaining online responsibility, focusing on thoughtful digital interactions.
- Evaluate the impact of online posts on personal and others' digital identities.

# Duration

30 minutes

## **Key Concepts**

- **Sharing Online:** The act of posting content, information, or personal data on the internet, which can include text, images, videos, and other digital media. It's important to share responsibly and consider the potential consequences.
- **Online Responsibility:** The practice of using technology respectfully and safely, mindful of one's impact on themselves and others.
