Positive Digital Citizens

Cyber Safety Lesson Plan (Age 9)

This lesson educates students on the qualities and behaviours of a positive digital citizen, promoting respectful and kind interaction in the online world.

Learning Objectives

Students will be able to:

- Define the qualities of a positive digital citizen
- Identify and practise good online behaviours.
- Understand the importance of being a positive digital citizen.

Duration

30 minutes

Key Concepts

- **Positive Digital Citizen:** Someone who engages responsibly, ethically, and safely in the digital world, contributing positively to online communities.
- **Online Behaviour:** How one acts on the internet, including communication, interactions, and sharing of information.

WRAP UP What have you learned today? Let's reflect on today's lesson.	Encourage reflection on what they've learned about being positive digital citizens and why it's important.
